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## **TIC: Private Foreign Buyers Continue to Drive Capital Inflows**


A net total of \$73.8 billion worth of short- and long-term capital flowed into the United States in August, while July's figure was revised down to \$118 billion. Private foreign buyers continue to increase their holdings.

### **U.S. Residents Net Sellers of Foreign Securities**

- Long-term net TIC inflows totaled \$ 113.0 billion in August down from July's record monthly gain. Among the various securities purchased, government agency and corporate bonds were the most popular with private foreign buyers.
- Meanwhile, U.S. investors were net sellers of foreign securities on the month, decreasing their holdings by \$18.0 billion—a trend seen in six of the eight months this year.

#### **Private/Official Divergence Widens**

- The divergence between foreign private buyers and official holdings continues to widen, with private buyers purchasing \$113.0 billion in securities, while foreign officials sold \$39.3 billion of their holdings (predominately U.S. Treasuries).
- In August, China and Japan decreased their holdings of U.S.
  Treasuries by \$33.7 billion and \$10.6 billion, respectfully; however, these countries remain top holders of U.S. Treasuries.
